PIN Launches a New Web Resource:

Traveling to the Holy Land: Following in the Foot Steps of Jesus

PIN's new website travel page offers practical tips for a Holy Land visit that will not only fulfill your dreams, but also guarantee a transformative experience via personal encounters.

Imagine yourself on the steps outside Damascus Gate, like the PIN travelers pictured here, learning about the situation in Jerusalem with Fayrouz Sharqawi of Grassroots Jerusalem. Or engaging in conversations with Palestinian Episcopal leaders like the Rev Fadi Diab, St Andrew's Church, in the West Bank city of Ramallah.



PIN's travel resources include not only the new <u>webpage</u> but also an accompanying brochure which will soon be available in printed format. The brochure is a user-friendly overview of the webpage. Here is a taste of the brochure:

As you consider both the ancient and modern histories of this remarkable place, how can you best experience the vital, living witness of Jesus' presence, as well as enjoy those special historical sites? There are several ways:

Encounter Palestinians. Meet and know the indigenous Palestinian people in East Jerusalem and the West Bank. Attend a church service and learn about the lives of modern Christians in the Holy Land.

Visit the Institutions of the Diocese of Jerusalem. Visit the churches, schools, health care facilities and guesthouses throughout Israel and the Palestinian territories. Learn about the work they are doing and the challenges and rewards of working in a place of "conflict".

Walk in Jesus' Footsteps. With the similarities of today 's Holy Land to Jesus' own time, it is important to trace the steps that he might have taken in the course of his ministry. Visit a refugee camp. Each camp has visitor centers where you are welcome to meet the residents and hear their stories. There are three camps in Bethlehem: Aida, Dheisheh, and Beit Jibrin. Visit the West Bank and learn what life is like under occupation and military control, just as it was for Jesus. Arrange a half-day tour in the ancient city of Hebron and learn about Jewish settlements. The Diocese of Jerusalem has churches and hospitals in Ramallah, Nablus, and Zebabdeh where you will be enthusiastically and graciously welcomed to learn about their work and ministries
